Pastor's Ponderings



Dear Christian friends,

He is risen! He is risen indeed. Alleluia! Those are the words we say each Easter morning as we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. But why do we celebrate? Why is the resurrection of Christ so comforting to us? In the questions our catechumens answer for their final examination, they learn that Jesus' resurrection is comforting to Christians for four reasons. It proves: 1) the He is the Son of God, 2) that His doctrine is true, 3) that God accepted the sacrifice of His Son for our sins, and 4) that we, too, will rise.

The Christians in Corinth had some questions about the resurrection of the dead. In response to their doubts, St. Paul boldly declared, "If there is no resurrection of the dead, not even Christ has been raised; and if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain, your faith also is in vain" (1 Corinthians 15:13-14). The St. Paul declared to them this joyous news: "But now Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who are asleep" (1 Corinthians 15:20). Christ has risen! He is risen indeed.

Jesus rose bodily from the dead. The very same cold, dead body that was placed in the tomb on Good Friday rose again on Easter Sunday. When He appeared to the disciples after His resurrection, they were afraid because they thought He was a bodiless spirit. But Jesus assured them, "See My hands and My feet... touch Me and see, for a spirit does not have flesh and bones as you see I have" (Luke 24:39). Thomas even placed his hand in Jesus' side and touched the nail prints in His hands! (John 20:27).

How will we look when we are raised from the dead on the Last Day? Using Jesus' resurrection as a comparison, the Bible declares this wonderful news: "We know that when He appears, we will be like Him, because we will see Him just as He is" (1 John 3:2). The Bible does not give an exact description of what our bodies will be like, but we can learn from the glorious resurrection of Jesus. Just as Jesus rose bodily from the dead, so also shall we rise, and we will have resurrection bodies that can be seen and touched. We will be raised, not with a body of imperfections, but with a body that will be like or in "conformity with the body of His glory" (Philippians 3:21).

The Corinthians worried that, in the resurrection, the bodies of their loved ones would emerge from their graves in a decomposed and grotesque form (sort of like the undead in the Pirates of the Caribbean). In order to calm their concerns about what resurrected bodies look like, St. Paul used an analogy of a plant and seed: "That which you sow does not come to life unless it dies; and that which you sow, you do not sow the body which is to be, but a bare grain, perhaps of wheat or something else. But God gives it a body just as He wished, and to each of the seeds a body of its own" (1 Corinthians 15:36-38).

Do not let your anticipation of the resurrection get clouded by worries over what your body will be like, as did the Corinthians. Focus instead on God's promise to you in Baptism: "If we have become united with Him in the likeness of His death, certainly we shall also be in the likeness of His resurrection" (Romans 6:5). Just as a lowly seed transforms into a glorious immortality. Therefore, boldly confess your faith in "the resurrection of the body and the life everlasting" (Nicene Creed). Look forward to the Last Day with expectation and joy, because "We know that when He appears, we will be like Him, because we will see Him just as He is" (1 John 3:2).

Stewardship Thoughts

In April we join with Christians around the world to celebrate Easter—the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the grave. The tomb is empty! Hallelujah! Jesus Christ is risen; He is risen indeed!

In Romans 6:3-4 St. Paul penned these memorable words: *“Don’t you know that all of us who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into His death? We were therefore buried with Him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life.”*

A large part of that “new life” is what we call Christian stewardship. A noted Lutheran leader of the past century said, “Christian stewardship is everything I do after I say I believe.”

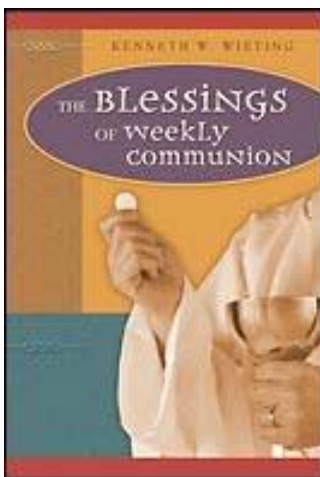
Maturing stewards remember that **“Christian stewardship is the free and joyous activity of the child of God and God’s family, the church, in managing all of life and life’s resources for God’s purposes.”**

Using our time and talents to support the ministry of the church is an important part of our stewardship! The giving of our money to help support the work of the church at the local, district and national levels is also an important part of our stewardship. Indeed, stewardship involves managing all of life and life’s resources in a way that accomplishes God’s purposes.

Jesus Christ has risen from the dead, never to die again. And because He lives, we too shall live forever. It is exciting to remember that what we do here and now as God’s stewards will have lasting benefits. By the using of our talents and giving of our time and money we are investing in a kingdom that will never end. St. Paul said it so well when he wrote these words in 1 Timothy 6:17-19: *“Command those who are rich in this present world not to be arrogant nor to put their hope in wealth, which is so uncertain, but to put their hope in God, who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment. Command them to do good, to be rich in good deeds, and to be generous and willing to share. In this way they will lay up treasure for themselves as a firm foundation for the coming age, so that they may take hold of the life that is truly life.”*

The use of our time, talent and money for worthy worldly projects is a good investment, but the benefits will last only for a short time. In contrast, the use of our time, talent and money to support the Lord’s work is an investment that will have everlasting benefits! What an encouragement for us as God’s stewards! A blessed Easter to you all!

Notes from Our Missionaries

Just a note to say thanks you for all the prayers and financial support you have been giving us. It is much appreciated. May God also bless your ministries where the Lord has you working. These past few months have had many suicides and other troubles here on the reservation. As was in the news we had a girl get stabbed to death in some gang violence. There have also been several accidents that claimed the life of young people. Much of this generates news, but the reality is that these things happen because these people don't have Christ in their lives.

Last week I attended a meeting sponsored by the Juvenile Detention Center. They indicated that most of the children indicated in their alcohol assessments that they did not believe in a higher power. This concerned them enough to call a meeting with the spiritual leaders. We will see where that ends up. From my view we are doing what needs to be done, I just wish it went faster. The Lord works on his time, and the devil never stops either. We keep sharing God's Word in worship and in Bible School, Bible Study, and confirmation, as well as with people in homes. Some days it seems as if we are making progress, other days not. But I know that Christ Jesus came into this world to save sinners. I know He is the one who can give these people hope.

In Parmelee things keep going. Last night a new family attended worship. I was pleased. I have been working with them to try and get their 7 year old to go to school. He has never gone, something about not getting a birth certificate. You wouldn't think that would be difficult, but it sure can be. Hopefully next week. I have also been having a good confirmation class in Parmelee with about 5 teenagers. It is amazing how much they don't know. I am glad I am able to teach them, and explain such basic things as what sin is. We look forward to celebrating Easter after our Lenten Season. Our services for Lent are always well attended. It is one of my favorite times of the year.

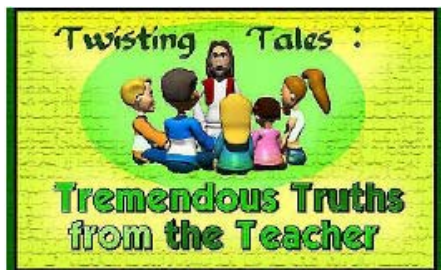
TLC Bible Study

Did My Baptism Count?

“Why should I baptize my baby?” “Should I wait until my child knows what is going on before I have him baptized?” “Should my relative, who is joining a new church, allow herself to be baptized—even though she was baptized as an infant?” These three questions have, somewhat unfortunately, become common nowadays within Lutheran congregations. Cultural changes and the rise of Evangelicalism have influenced our understanding of the blessed sacrament. Sadly, it seems, we Lutherans have failed to teach the value of baptism and the blessings it brings.

Fortunately, Martin Luther addressed this issue almost 500 years ago when two pastors sent him a letter asking him about the practice of baptizing a Christian a second time. Luther’s response, written at the end of 1527 and the beginning of 1528 addresses the issues raised by the pastors and in so doing, provides a nice summary of the theology of baptism in general, and infant baptism in particular. Recently, Luther’s letter has been translated and published in a useful booklet entitled, “*Did My Baptism Count?*”

Study of the Formula of Concord

Martin Luther died on February 18, 1546. A year later, in the Smalcald War, Lutheran princes were defeated by Catholic forces. The Lutherans all too quickly fell to squabbling about doctrine. How such contentiousness and which doctrinal viewpoints would be affirmed would mark the future of the Church for centuries to come.

The Formula of Concord, published in 1577, helped the Lutheran Church deal with the previous three decades of internal conflicts. Perhaps the Lutheran Church would not have survived the sixteenth-century doctrinal wars without the Formula of Concord. This study will help us to discover anew how the Formula of Concord helps the Church today with theological, doctrinal, and daily life issues. All adults of the congregation are invited to join us each Sunday at 10:45 a.m.
